RE: Solid Waste Plan Recertification Schedule

DATE: October 6, 2006

As you are aware from the other memo in this envelope the due dates for many local government's Comprehensive Plans are being changed and extended by DCA. In 2003, we aligned both the Solid Waste Management Planning due dates with the Comprehensive Plan due dates for each city/county in order to maximize your local government's planning efforts by ensuring the population, economic, and land-use projections were consistently reflected in both your solid waste management plan and comprehensive plan. While we continue to recognize the importance of maintaining consistency among all of your local government's plans, the importance of timely, careful and accurate solid waste planning in Georgia has never been more critical than it is today.

A recent Georgia Supreme Court ruling has empowered local governments throughout the State to use their Solid Waste Management Plans as a tool to manage the siting, and potentially the expansion of, solid waste handling facilities within their respective jurisdictions. While the number of landfills in Georgia is shrinking, the landfills that are being sited and built continue to grow in size making it all the more critical that local governments examine and plan for how these facilities "fit" into their communities and this recent Supreme Court decision empowers Georgia's counties and cities to do just that. Additionally, markets in Georgia for commonly recycled materials (paper, plastic, aluminum, etc.) have never been stronger yet, the amount of recyclables being disposed in landfills instead of being diverted to these markets is on the rise.

Given these conditions, the due date for **your community's Solid Waste Management Plan Update will not change** and may be different from the due date of your local government's comprehensive plan. Approximately one-half of Georgia's 700 counties and cities have already updated their solid waste plans between 2003 and now, and the remaining one-half are scheduled to have their solid waste plans completed between now and 2008. After this statewide cycle for Solid Waste Management Plans is complete in

October 6, 2006

2008, DCA intends on realigning the due dates for both your solid waste and comprehensive plans back to a single date for both plans.

Your community's full Solid Waste Management Plan Update is due on 10/31/2006. In order to transition your 10 year planning cycle to meet the new Comprehensive Planning due date your next full Solid Waste Management Plan Update is due on 10/31/2007. Given that there is less than five years between the due date of your current full plan and the new due date, you may amend your local government's recently updated plan if necessary or, if no changes are required, you may certify that you have collection capability and disposal capacity for the planning period and simply readopt the existing updated plan.

Mr. Walton;

Again thanks for your assistance. As to your questions, our permit # PBR-017—02COL is still current as is our permit # PBR-017-03TS. Sunbelt Medical first began talking with the City of Sardis about modifying our existing facility over two years ago. The proposed modifications will require a new permit from EPD. Sunbelt Medical received a letter of approval from the City earlier this year to site the facility in the City. We can provide you a copy of this approval if necessary. It appears that Mactec was not made aware of these plans as you were completing the solid waste management plan new(SWMP). To avoid the City having to possibly modify the new SWMP, inclusion of the information we requested in the plan would be appreciated by Sunbelt and the City of Sardis. Also, could you tell us which City(s) have not provided the required Resolution adopting the new plan to Burke County and what the proposed schedule for completing this action is.

Mr. Sayers,

Good morning. After talking with Paige Hatley, the project coordinator here for the Burke County SWMP, it's been clarified to me that the SWMP has been adopted by almost all jurisdictions in, and including, Burke County. However, the County has yet to collect adoption resolutions from one or more of the smaller cities, so technically the SWMP has not been finally submitted to DCA along with all adoption resolutions, as required.

That said, the SMWP is at a status where changes should not be made except, potentially, to make corrections in cases where it is identified that information is not correct. On this point, I'm not clear whether your request for the footnote represents a correction or the addition of new information. According to Paige, records show that Sunbelt Medical is already permitted by EPD for bio-medical waste, Permit # PBR-017-02COL, specifically for Operation. This is not indicated in the Disposal Facilities table in the SWMP, however the fact that Sunbelt Medical is permitted as a transfer station is recognized in the table of facilities in the SWMP.

If the EPD bio-medical permit (PBR-017-02COL) is still current, then we can talk to Burke County and DCA about amending the table to accurately reflect that existing permit. Also, if the facility was previously approved to expand, but we weren't aware of that and therefore didn't include that in the plan, then we could potentially make that correction. Based on your understanding, is the footnote that you are requesting consistent with either of these conditions?

Please let us know your opinion on this before we contact Burke County (our client) or DCA to pose any questions. Thanks.





REPORT OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

On October 12, 1999, Burke County/ Girard, Midville, Sardis, Waynesboro, and Vidette submitted a Solid Waste Management Plan Five Year Short Term Work Program 2000 – 2004 to the CSRA Regional Development Center (RDC) for review. The purpose of the submission was for the RDC to determine whether the amendment was constructed in accordance with Georgia's Minimum Planning Standard and Procedures for Solid Waste Management established for the implementation of the Georgia Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Act of 1990, O.C.G.A. Section 12-8-20.

A regional public hearing was held at the CSRA Regional Development Center on October 25, 1999 at 11:00 A.M. Only Martin Rose, Director of Planning with the RDC, was present at the hearing. The purpose of the hearing was to elicit comments from other governmental jurisdictions or agencies which may be impacted by the STWP. Twenty governmental units, including state agencies and surrounding local governments, were notified by mail of the regional hearing on October 12, 1999. None of the agencies notified had representatives attend the hearing, nor were written comments received.

Upon review, the RDC recommends approval of the Five Year Short Term Work Program 2000 – 2004. The RDC did not find any potentially adverse impacts of the STWP on surrounding jurisdictions. The STWP is in compliance the Solid Waste Management Plan Approval section of the Minimum Planning Standard and Procedures for Solid Waste Management. It is also consistent with the Georgia Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Act of 1990. The STWP does not give rise to conflicts with the Solid Waste Management Plans of surrounding jurisdictions.

Burke County/ Girard, Midville, Sardis, Waynesboro, and Vidette have also completed a Report of Accomplishments detailing the County's progress in implementing the activities outlined in the previous Solid Waste Management Five Year Short Term Work Program, 1992 – 1999.

Due to a contract between Burke County and Georgia Waste Systems, Inc., dated October 13, 1998, for solid waste transportation and disposal services of Burke County solid waste, the County hereby amends the Burke County Solid Waste Management Plan.

The Burke County Landfill no longer accepts municipal waste. Rather than construct a new landfill, the County has opted to construct a transfer station and contract with a private transportation and disposal company.

Since the execution of the aforementioned contract, Burke County collects municipal solid waste and transports it to the Burke County transfer station on Clark Place Road. Georgia Waste Systems, Inc., then transports the waste to a duly permitted sanitary landfill mutually agreeable to the parties.

The initial term of the contract is five years, with extensions of up to two additional five year terms unless either party elects to cancel by giving the other party at least ninety days prior notice.

SUBJECT: Adjustment of 10-year Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP) Updates

A decade ago, solid waste management planning was a top priority for local officials across the state. Georgia had less than five years of disposal capacity and many parts of the state were struggling to provide adequate solid waste collection services. In 1990, the Solid Waste Management Act was adopted, requiring all local governments to prepare a Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Plan that demonstrated:

- a minimum of 10 years of solid waste disposal capacity,
- identified an environmentally sound solid waste collection system, and
- set forth a strategy that would help the state achieve it's goal of a 25% per capita reduction in the disposal of municipal solid waste.

While the urgency to prepare and implement solid waste management plans has diminished, the need to have an up-to-date Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP) is as strong as ever. Georgia's population continues to grow, and while over 550 local governments have implemented recycling programs, the state has fallen short of meeting its 25% waste disposal reduction goal. Many of the solid waste management services provided by the public sector have been privatized over the past decade, changing the level and type of solid waste management services available throughout the state. And while the amount of disposal capacity in the state has risen sharply over the last decade, this capacity is found in fewer, larger regional facilities.

With all of these changes and the changes to come over the next decade, it is critical that we continue to monitor and plan for the proper management of the solid waste generated within our state. In order to help eliminate duplicative planning efforts and to better coordinate local government planning responsibilities, DCA has consolidated local Solid Waste Management and Comprehensive planning due dates. Thus, the SWMP due date for Burke County and the cities of Girard, Keysville, Midville, Sardis, Vidette, and Waynesboro has been changed to coincide with the established deadline for your Comprehensive Plan.

The 12/31/04 due date for completion of the **Solid Waste Management Plan update** by Burke County and the cities of Girard, Keysville, Midville, Sardis, Vidette, and Waynesboro **has been changed to 10/31/06.**

To remain in compliance with State law and remain eligible for solid waste loans, grants, and permits, Burke County and the cities of Girard, Keysville, Midville, Sardis, Vidette, and Waynesboro must prepare an updated Solid Waste Management Plan, have it approved by DCA, and be locally adopted by 10/31/06.

Please remember that this schedule also includes the time necessary for the Central Savannah River Area RDC and DCA to review and approve the Solid Waste Management Plan. Assistance and guidance documents on preparing the Solid Waste Management Plan will be available in November from your RDC Office or by contacting Mary Harrington of my staff at (404) 679-3144 or mharring@dca.state.ga.us.

We hope this one time change in your solid waste management plan update schedule does not create any undue inconveniences and that it presents an opportunity to enhance the coordination of your local planning efforts. We believe that the local governments that are affected by these changes will benefit from this decision.

As you are aware from the other memo in this envelope the due dates for many local government's Comprehensive Plans are being changed and extended by DCA. In 2003, we aligned both the Solid Waste Management Planning due dates with the Comprehensive Plan due dates for each city/county in order to maximize your local government's planning efforts by ensuring the population, economic, and land-use projections were consistently reflected in both your solid waste management plan and comprehensive plan. While we continue to recognize the importance of maintaining consistency among all of your local government's plans, the importance of timely, careful and accurate solid waste planning in Georgia has never been more critical than it is today.

A recent Georgia Supreme Court ruling has empowered local governments throughout the State to use their Solid Waste Management Plans as a tool to manage the siting, and potentially the expansion of, solid waste handling facilities within their respective jurisdictions. While the number of landfills in Georgia is shrinking, the landfills that are being sited and built continue to grow in size making it all the more critical that local governments examine and plan for how these facilities "fit" into their communities and this recent Supreme Court decision empowers Georgia's counties and cities to do just that. Additionally, markets in Georgia for commonly recycled materials (paper, plastic, aluminum, etc.) have never been stronger yet, the amount of recyclables being disposed in landfills instead of being diverted to these markets is on the rise.

Given these conditions, the due date for **your community's Solid Waste Management Plan Update will not change** and may be different from the due date of your local government's comprehensive plan. Approximately one-half of Georgia's 700 counties and cities have already updated their solid waste plans between 2003 and now, and the remaining one-half are scheduled to have their solid waste plans completed between now and 2008. After this statewide cycle for Solid Waste Management Plans is complete in

October 6, 2006

2008, DCA intends on realigning the due dates for both your solid waste and comprehensive plans back to a single date for both plans.

Your community's full Solid Waste Management Plan Update is due on 10/31/2006. In order to transition your 10 year planning cycle to meet the new Comprehensive Planning due date your next full Solid Waste Management Plan Update is due on 10/31/2007. Given that there is less than five years between the due date of your current full plan and the new due date, you may amend your local government's recently updated plan if necessary or, if no changes are required, you may certify that you have collection capability and disposal capacity for the planning period and simply readopt the existing updated plan.
