ABOUT US

Georgia Serves/Georgia Commission is located within the Georgia Department of Community Affairs and operates as the administrative agency for funds from the AmeriCorps/Corporation for National and Community Service, the federal agency that houses the AmeriCorps family of programs.

The Georgia Legislature created the Georgia Commission for Service and Volunteerism (GCSV) in 1994 in response to the National and Community Service Act passed by Congress in 1993. The Commission's board consists of 23 members appointed by the Governor. Commissioners serve three-year renewable terms and are responsible for helping to promote volunteerism, create impact awareness, assist in the decision-making process, and contribute to the overall success of AmeriCorps Georgia.

There are four Georgia Serves staff members located within the Community Development Division of the Georgia Department of Community Affairs. Their responsibilities are to provide oversight, compliance monitoring, technical assistance, and support to the portfolio of programs.

WHAT WE DO

- We create and promote opportunities for Georgians to serve.
- We support organizations that use volunteer service to solve Georgia's community problems.
- We make sure the investment in volunteer service is protected and managed well.

OUR PURPOSE

Georgia Serves grants funds to qualifying agencies for the purpose of implementing AmeriCorps programs in their communities. These organizations recruit AmeriCorps Members who provide direct, community-specific services to the targeted population. Through AmeriCorps, organizations are provided the opportunity to address areas of critical needs in their communities and neighborhoods in the areas of Education, Economic Opportunity, Disaster Services, Healthy Futures, Environmental Stewardship, and Veterans/Military Families.

All awardees, including the Georgia Department of Community Affairs and Georgia Serves, are charged with leveraging either cash match for federal funds, in-kind match, or a combination of both. It is important to note the leverage for these AmeriCorps Grants. The Governor and Georgia legislature generously contributed \$218,841 in state appropriations to match the Commission Support Grant, and by partnering with the Georgia Association of Broadcasters, Georgia Serves received \$592,819 in in-kind match from public service announcements across the state.

AMERICORPS GEORGIA



The Georgia Commission funded 18 AmeriCorps programs for the 2020-2021 program year, and they were successful in recruiting 540 AmeriCorps Members to serve at more than 50 sites. These members recruited 1,132 volunteers across the state who served 11,197 hours.

In 2021, 2,240 persons applied to be AmeriCorps Members. As in years past, there is a significant difference in the number of AmeriCorps Members recruited versus the number of applicants. These numbers show us that people want to get involved and want to be a part of the solution.

Enrollment of members, service locations and number of volunteers were affected by COVID restrictions, and understandably so, but these simple measurements do not reflect the full impact of service and volunteerism in our state. Despite the complication of our communities continuing to deal with COVID and its variants, AmeriCorps members continued response and recovery efforts for Georgia communities.

AMERICORPS IMPACT

Education/College Readiness

- Over 11,700 students were served by AmeriCorps members either through tutoring, mentoring or academic support.
- 291 economically disadvantaged students received college scholarships due to the assistance of The Scholarship Academy AmeriCorps members.
- Youth Villages reported that members engaged 73 youth with severe emotional and behavioral issues in service-learning activities to raise their awareness of civic engagement.
- Georgia 4H AmeriCorps members engaged 17,471 students around the state in-school educational club meetings during the full academic school year.

Creating Economic Opportunity

- Goodwill assisted 3,607 individuals with securing employment
- Covenant House served 168 economically disadvantaged individuals who received job placement services
- New American Pathways AmeriCorps members assisted 568 adult clients with educational support that includes job placement, resume writing workshops, technological training, and English classes. Also, 162 newly arrived refugee clients were able to gain safe and stable households within 90 days of arrival thanks to Project RISE program.
- Covenant House members served 74 homeless/runaway youth to help them secure employment this year.
- ESP had a total of 627 active families of an individual with a disability who participated in at least one program over the past two years. Engaging with 130 new families, serving families from 31 counties in Georgia and five states, traveling 5,400 miles to provide free program transportation to families across our community, and providing 2,489 points of engagement through family support initiatives.

Environmental Stewardship

- AmeriCorps members serving at the Georgia Sea Turtle Center provided education or training in environmental stewardship to 7,330 individuals.
- Also, the AmeriCorps GSTC Sea turtle dawn patrol and night patrol teams, documented that 128 sea turtle nests were laid on Jekyll Island last summer season with an estimated 3,209 hatchlings making their way back to the ocean.

GEORGIA SERVES INITIATIVES

GEORGIA STUDENT SERVICE AWARD

The Georgia Commission awards certificates and service honor cords at graduation ceremonies to Georgia students who meet a predetermined threshold of service hours in their communities. To qualify for the Georgia Student Service Award, a minimum of 200 hours by graduation is required. Graduating seniors who reach the milestone will receive a certificate and a red, white, and blue service cord to be worn at graduation ceremonies. During the Spring of 2021 only 113 Georgia students received awards and together, these students served a total 17,359 service hours.

Service can be performed through school sponsored activities and/or through outside organizations such as churches and other clubs. Both public and private schools are eligible to participate in the Georgia Student Service Award program. Home schooled students may also participate if hours can be certified.
