A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

1 To amend Titles 8, 22, 23, and 36 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to  
2 buildings and housing, eminent domain, equity, and local government, respectively, so as to  
3 provide for the comprehensive revision of provisions regarding the power of eminent  
4 domain; to provide for a short title; to change certain provisions regarding a housing  
5 authority's power of eminent domain; to provide for a new definition of blighted properties;  
6 to provide for other definitions; to provide for a public use requirement for exercising the  
7 power of eminent domain; to change certain provisions relating to the power of eminent  
8 domain and the presumption of a public use; to provide for attorney fees in certain cases  
9 challenging the use of eminent domain; to provide certain exemptions to the applicability of  
10 the power of eminent domain to public utilities; to provide for certain changes regarding  
11 eminent domain to require a public use; to change certain provisions regarding when the use  
12 of eminent domain is allowed; to provide guidelines for the use of condemnation; to provide  
13 for practice and procedure relative to condemnation; to provide for testimony relative to the  
14 value of condemned property; to provide for expedited hearings; to provide that the  
15 Department of Community Affairs produce a standard notice of rights form; to repeal  
16 provisions relating to certain appeals from assessor's awards; to change compensation for  
17 special masters; to change provisions relating to the right of appealing the award of the  
18 special master in condemnation proceedings; to change provisions relating to the use of  
19 condemnation for waterworks; to grant standing to municipalities, counties, and housing  
20 authorities to seek certain equitable remedies and proceedings; to provide for certain  
21 notification requirements; to provide for certain restrictions regarding the use of eminent  
22 domain under or in connection with a redevelopment plan and urban redevelopment; to  
23 change certain provisions regarding public hearings relating to redevelopment plans; to  
24 provide for the reconveyance of condemned property under certain circumstances; to provide  
25 for reimbursement of reasonable costs and expenses incurred because of condemnation  
26 proceedings; to provide for certain exemptions; to provide for revisions for purposes of  
27 conformity; to provide for related matters; to provide for an effective date and for  
28 applicability; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

2 **SECTION 1.**

3 This Act shall be known and may be cited as "The Landowner's Bill of Rights and Private  
4 Property Protection Act."

5 **SECTION 2.**

6 Title 8 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to buildings and housing, is  
7 amended by inserting a new Code section in Part 2 of Article 1 of Chapter 3, relating to the  
8 powers of housing authorities generally, to read as follows:

9 "8-3-31.1.

10 (a) As used in this Code section, the term 'public use' shall have the meaning specified in  
11 Code Section 22-1-1.

12 (b) Any exercise of the power of eminent domain under this chapter or Chapter 4 of this  
13 title must:

14 (1) Be for a public use; and

15 (2) Be approved by resolution of the governing body of the municipality or county in  
16 conformity with the procedures specified in Code Section 22-1-10."

17 **SECTION 3.**

18 Title 22 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to eminent domain, is amended  
19 by striking Code Section 22-1-1, relating to eminent domain definitions, and inserting in its  
20 place a new Code section to read as follows:

21 "22-1-1.

22 As used in this title, the term:

23 (1) 'Blighted property,' 'blighted,' or 'blight' means any urbanized or developed property  
24 which:

25 (A) Presents two or more of the following conditions:

26 (i) Uninhabitable, unsafe, or abandoned structures;

27 (ii) Inadequate provisions for ventilation, light, air, or sanitation;

28 (iii) An imminent harm to life or other property caused by fire, flood, hurricane,

29 tornado, earthquake, storm, or other natural catastrophe respecting which the

30 Governor has declared a state of emergency under state law or has certified the need

31 for disaster assistance under federal law; provided, however, this division shall not

32 apply to property unless the relevant public agency has given notice in writing to the

33 property owner regarding specific harm caused by the property and the owner has

34 failed to take reasonable measures to remedy the harm;

1 (iv) A site identified by the federal Environmental Protection Agency as a Superfund  
 2 site pursuant to 42 U.S.C. Section 9601, et seq., or environmental contamination to  
 3 an extent that requires remedial investigation or a feasibility study;

4 (v) Repeated illegal activity on the individual property of which the property owner  
 5 knew or should have known; or

6 (vi) The maintenance of the property is below state, county, or municipal codes for  
 7 at least one year after notice of the code violation; and

8 (B) Is conducive to ill health, transmission of disease, infant mortality, or crime in the  
 9 immediate proximity of the property.

10 Property shall not be deemed blighted because of esthetic conditions.

11 (2) 'Common carrier' means any carrier required by law to convey passengers or freight  
 12 without refusal if the approved fare or charge is paid.

13 (3) 'Condemnor' or 'condemning authority' means:

14 (A) The State of Georgia or any branch or any department, board, commission, agency,  
 15 or authority of the executive branch of the government of the State of Georgia;

16 (B) Any county or municipality of the State of Georgia;

17 (C) Any housing authority with approval of the governing authority of the city or  
 18 county as provided in Code Section 8-3-31.1;

19 (D) Any other political subdivision of the State of Georgia which possesses the power  
 20 of eminent domain; and

21 (E) All public utilities that possess the right or power of eminent domain.

22 (4) 'Economic development' means any economic activity to increase tax revenue, tax  
 23 base, or employment or improve general economic health, when the activity does not  
 24 result in:

25 (A) Transfer of land to public ownership;

26 (B) Transfer of property to a private entity that is a public utility;

27 (C) Lease of property to private entities that occupy an incidental area within a public  
 28 project; or

29 (D) The remedy of blight.

30 (5) 'Each person with a legal claim' means the owner of the property or of any remainder,  
 31 reversion, mortgage, lease, security deed, or other claim in the property.

32 ~~(1)~~(6) 'Interest' means any title or nontitle interest other than fee simple title.

33 ~~(2)~~(7) 'Persons' means individuals, partnerships, associations, and corporations, domestic  
 34 or foreign.

35 ~~(3)~~(8) 'Property' means fee simple title.

36 (9)(A) 'Public use' means:

1 (i) The possession, occupation, or use of the land by the general public or by state or  
 2 local governmental entities;

3 (ii) The use of land for the creation or functioning of public utilities;

4 (iii) The opening of roads, the construction of defenses, or the providing of channels  
 5 of trade or travel;

6 (iv) The acquisition of property where title is clouded due to the inability to identify  
 7 or locate all owners of the property;

8 (v) The acquisition of property where unanimous consent is received from each  
 9 person with a legal claim that has been identified and found; or

10 (vi) The remedy of blight.

11 (B) The public benefit of economic development shall not constitute a public use.

12 (10) 'Public utility' means any publicly, privately, or cooperatively owned line, facility,  
 13 or system for producing, transmitting, or distributing communications, power, electricity,  
 14 light, heat, gas, oil products, water, steam, clay, waste, storm water not connected with  
 15 highway drainage, and other similar services and commodities, including publicly owned  
 16 fire and police and traffic signals and street lighting systems, which directly or indirectly  
 17 serve the public. This term also means a person, municipal corporation, county, state  
 18 agency, or public authority which owns or manages a utility as defined in this paragraph.  
 19 This term shall also include common carriers and railroads."

#### 20 SECTION 4.

21 Said title is further amended by striking Code Section 22-1-2, relating to the nature of  
 22 eminent domain, and inserting in its place a new Code section to read as follows:

23 "22-1-2.

24 (a) The right of eminent domain is the right of the state, through its regular organization,  
 25 to reassert, either temporarily or permanently, its dominion over any portion of the soil of  
 26 the state on account of public exigency and for the public good. Thus, in time of war or  
 27 insurrection the proper authorities may possess and hold any part of the territory of the state  
 28 for the common safety; and in time of peace the General Assembly may authorize the  
 29 appropriation of the same to public purposes, such as the opening of roads, construction of  
 30 defenses, or providing channels for trade or travel. Notwithstanding any other provisions  
 31 of law, neither this state nor any political subdivision thereof nor any other condemning  
 32 authority shall use eminent domain unless it is for public use. Public use is a matter of law  
 33 to be determined by the court and the condemnor bears the burden of proof.

34 (b) All condemnations shall not be converted to any use other than a public use for 20  
 35 years from the initial condemnation.

1 (c)(1) If property acquired through the power of eminent domain from an owner fails to  
 2 be put to a public use within five years, the former property owner may apply to the  
 3 condemnor or its successor or assign for reconveyance or quitclaim of the property to the  
 4 former property owner or for additional compensation for such property. For purposes  
 5 of this subsection, property shall be considered to have been put to a public use at the  
 6 point in time when substantial good faith effort has been expended on a project to put the  
 7 property to public use, notwithstanding the fact that the project may not have been  
 8 completed. The application shall be in writing, and the condemnor or its successor or  
 9 assign shall act on the application within 60 days by:

10 (A) Executing a reconveyance or quitclaim of the property upon receipt of  
 11 compensation not to exceed the amount of the compensation paid by the condemnor at  
 12 the time of acquisition; or

13 (B) Paying additional compensation to the former owner of the property, such  
 14 compensation to be calculated by subtracting the price paid by the condemnor for the  
 15 property at the time of acquisition from the fair market value of the property at the time  
 16 the application is filed.

17 (2) If the condemnor fails to take either action within 60 days, the former property owner  
 18 may, within the next 90 days following, initiate an action in the superior court in the  
 19 county in which the property is located to reacquire the property or receive additional  
 20 compensation.

21 (3) The condemnor shall provide notice to each former owner of the property prior to  
 22 acquisition if the condemnor fails to put such property to a public use within five years.  
 23 The condemnee shall have one year from the date notice is received to bring an  
 24 application under this subsection.

25 (d) In the case that property is acquired from more than one owner for the same public use  
 26 and reconveyance or additional compensation to a single owner is impracticable, any party  
 27 to the original condemnation or each person with a legal claim in such condemnation may  
 28 file an action in the superior court in the county in which the property is located for an  
 29 equitable resolution.

30 (e) This Code section shall not apply to condemnations subject to Code Section 22-3-162  
 31 or Title 32."

## 32 SECTION 5.

33 Said title is further amended by inserting new Code sections to read as follows:

34 "22-1-9.

35 In order to encourage and expedite the acquisition of real property by agreements with  
 36 owners, to avoid litigation and relieve congestion in the courts, to assure consistent

1 treatment for property owners, and to promote public confidence in land acquisition  
2 practices, all condemnations and potential condemnations shall, to the greatest extent  
3 practicable, be guided by the following policies and practices:

4 (1) The condemning authority shall make every reasonable effort to acquire  
5 expeditiously real property by negotiation;

6 (2) Where the condemning authority seeks to obtain a fee simple interest in real property,  
7 real property shall be appraised before the initiation of negotiations, and the owner or his  
8 or her designated representatives shall be given an opportunity to accompany the  
9 appraiser during his or her inspection of the property, except that the condemning  
10 authority may, by law, rule, regulation, or ordinance, prescribe a procedure to waive the  
11 appraisal in cases involving the acquisition by sale or donation of property with a low fair  
12 market value;

13 (3) Before the initiation of negotiations for fee simple interest for real property the  
14 condemning authority shall establish an amount which it believes to be just compensation  
15 and shall make a prompt offer to acquire the property for the full amount so established.  
16 In no event shall such amount be less than the condemning authority's independent  
17 appraisal of the fair market value of such property. The condemning authority shall  
18 provide the owner of real property to be acquired with a written statement of, and  
19 summary of the basis for, the amount he or she established as just compensation. Where  
20 appropriate, the just compensation for the real property acquired and for damages to  
21 remaining real property shall be separately stated. The condemning authority shall  
22 consider alternative sites suggested by the owner of the property as of the compensation  
23 offered;

24 (4) No owner shall be required to surrender possession of real property before the  
25 condemning authority pays the agreed purchase price or deposits with the court in  
26 accordance with this title, for the benefit of the owner, an amount not less than the  
27 condemning authority's appraisal of the fair market value of such property or the amount  
28 of the award of compensation in the condemnation proceeding for such property;

29 (5) The construction or development of a project for public use shall be so scheduled  
30 that, to the greatest extent practicable, no person lawfully occupying real property shall  
31 be required to move from a dwelling or to move his or her business or farm operation  
32 without at least 90 days' written notice from the condemning authority of the date by  
33 which such move is required;

34 (6) If the condemning authority permits an owner or tenant to occupy the real property  
35 acquired on a rental basis for a short term or for a period subject to termination by the  
36 condemning authority on short notice, the amount of rent required shall not exceed the  
37 fair rental value of the property to a short-term occupier;

1 (7) In no event shall the condemnor act in bad faith in order to compel an agreement on  
2 the price to be paid for the property;

3 (8) If any legal interest in real property is to be acquired by exercise of the power of  
4 eminent domain, the condemning authority shall institute formal condemnation  
5 proceedings. No condemnor shall intentionally make it necessary for an owner to  
6 institute legal proceedings to prove the fact of the taking of his or her real property; and

7 (9) A person whose real property is being acquired in accordance with this title may,  
8 after the person has been fully informed of his or her right to receive just compensation  
9 for such property, donate such property, any part thereof, any legal interest therein, or any  
10 compensation paid to a condemning authority, as such person shall determine.

11 22-1-10.

12 (a) Prior to exercising the power of eminent domain, a governmental condemnor shall:

13 (1) Not less than 15 days before any meeting at which a resolution approving the  
14 exercise of eminent domain is to be considered, post a sign, if possible, in the right of  
15 way adjacent to each property that is subject to the proposed use of the eminent domain  
16 power stating the time, date, and place of such meeting;

17 (2) Attempt to serve the condemnee personally with notice of the meeting not less than  
18 15 days before any meeting at which such resolution is to be considered, unless service  
19 is acknowledged or waived by the condemnee. If the attempted service is unsuccessful,  
20 service of notice may be satisfied by mail or statutory overnight delivery to the property  
21 owner at the address of record and, if different from the property owner, to the parties in  
22 possession of the property, return receipt requested;

23 (3) Ensure that any notice that is required by law to be published be placed in the county  
24 legal organ, but such notice shall not be published in the legal notices section of such  
25 newspaper; and

26 (4) Ensure that any meeting at which such resolution is to be considered and voted on  
27 shall commence after 6:00 P.M.

28 Any such resolution shall specifically and conspicuously delineate each parcel to be  
29 affected.

30 (b) A nongovernmental condemnor shall, with respect to its exercise of the power of  
31 eminent domain in general, by action of the governing body or chief executive officer of  
32 the condemnor designate who is authorized to approve the exercise of the power of eminent  
33 domain by the condemnor and provide a method for documenting the time of the exercise  
34 of final approval of a particular exercise of the power of eminent domain by that individual  
35 or group of individuals. Such a condemning authority shall with respect to any particular  
36 exercise of the power of eminent domain:

1 (1) Not less than 15 days before the documented time of approval of the exercise of  
2 eminent domain, post a sign, if possible, in the right of way adjacent to each property that  
3 is subject to the proposed use of the eminent domain power stating: (A) that the property  
4 is subject to a proposed condemnation which may be initiated after 15 days from the date  
5 of posting; (B) the date of posting; and (C) the name, business address, and telephone  
6 number of the condemnor;

7 (2) Not less than 15 days before the documented time of approval of the exercise of  
8 eminent domain serve the condemnee personally with notice of the proposed  
9 condemnation stating: (A) that the property is subject to a proposed condemnation which  
10 may be initiated after 15 days from the date of service; (B) the date of service; and (C)  
11 the name, business address, and telephone number of the condemnor. If the attempted  
12 service is unsuccessful, service of notice may be satisfied by mail or statutory overnight  
13 delivery to the property owner at the address of record and, if different from the property  
14 owner, to the parties in possession of the property, return receipt requested; and

15 (3) Provide the condemnee with an opportunity to meet with the individual or group of  
16 individuals having the power of documented approval or a representative of such  
17 individual or individuals.

18 (c) The condemnee may in writing waive any rights of the condemnee under this Code  
19 section.

20 (d) Any notice required to be personally served or mailed under this Code section shall be  
21 accompanied by a written statement of the rights that the condemnee possesses including  
22 but not limited to the right to notice, damages, hearing, and appeal of any award entered  
23 by the special master as described in this title. The written statement of rights shall also  
24 include the right to bring a motion pursuant to Code Section 22-1-11 as well as a sample  
25 motion. The Department of Community Affairs shall promulgate written notice of rights  
26 forms that shall be used for purposes of this subsection. The Department of Community  
27 Affairs shall promulgate different notice forms for each of the types of condemnation  
28 proceedings authorized by law. This subsection shall not become effective until the  
29 Department of Community Affairs has promulgated the written notice of rights forms  
30 contemplated under this subsection and such forms shall be promulgated no later than  
31 January 1, 2007.

32 (e) This Code section shall not apply to condemnations for the purposes of constructing  
33 or expanding one or more electric transmission lines, to condemnations pursuant to Code  
34 Section 46-8-121, or to any condemnations under Title 32.



1 22-1-10.1.

2 (a) Except as provided in subsections (b) and (c) of this Code section, no action for  
3 condemnation may be brought in any court of this state until at least 30 days after the date  
4 of the resolution or documented approval described in Code Section 22-1-10.

5 (b) If an emergency condition exists requiring the acquisition of property for the protection  
6 of the public health and safety, the condemnor may declare the existence of an emergency  
7 and adopt a resolution defining the emergency. Notice and hearing as required by Code  
8 Section 22-1-10 may be waived by the condemning body in an emergency condition.

9 (c) This Code section shall not apply to the acquisition or condemnation of property where  
10 consent is received from each person with a legal claim that has been identified or found.

11 22-1-11.

12 Before the vesting of title in the condemnor and upon motion of the condemnee, or within  
13 ten days of the entry of the special master's award by entry of exception to the case, the  
14 court shall determine whether the exercise of the power of eminent domain is for a public  
15 use and whether the condemning authority has the legal authority to exercise the power of  
16 eminent domain and may stay other proceedings of the condemnation pending the decision  
17 of the court. The condemning authority shall bear the burden of proof by the evidence  
18 presented that the condemnation is for a public use as defined in Code Section 22-1-1.  
19 Nothing in this Code section shall be construed to require the condemnee to seek or obtain  
20 a special master's award prior to a hearing or decision by the court under this Code section.

21 22-1-12.

22 In all actions where a condemning authority exercises the power of eminent domain, the  
23 court having jurisdiction of a proceeding instituted by a condemnor to acquire real property  
24 by condemnation shall award the owner of any right or title to or interest in such real  
25 property such sum as will in the opinion of the court reimburse such owner for his or her  
26 reasonable costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney, appraisal, and engineering  
27 fees, actually incurred because of the condemnation proceedings, if:

28 (1) The final judgment is that the condemning authority cannot acquire the real property  
29 by condemnation; or

30 (2) The proceeding is abandoned by the condemning authority.

31 22-1-13.

32 In addition to the types of relocation damages permissible under law, any condemnee that  
33 is displaced as a result of the condemnation shall be entitled to:

- 1 (1) Actual reasonable expenses in moving himself or herself, his or her family, business,  
 2 farm operation, or other personal property within a reasonable distance from the property  
 3 condemned;
- 4 (2) Actual direct losses of tangible personal property as a result of moving or  
 5 discontinuing a business or farm operation;
- 6 (3) Such other relocation expenses as authorized by law; and
- 7 (4) With the consent of the condemnee, the condemnor may provide alternative site  
 8 property as full or partial compensation.

9 22-1-14.

10 (a) When property is condemned under this title or any other title of this Code, the value  
 11 of the condemned property may be determined through lay or expert testimony and its  
 12 admissibility shall be addressed to the sound discretion of the court.

13 (b) If any party to a condemnation proceeding seeks to introduce expert testimony as to  
 14 the issue of just and adequate compensation, Code Section 24-9-67.1 shall not apply."

15 **SECTION 6.**

16 Said title is further amended by repealing Code Section 22-2-84.1, relating to appeals to  
 17 superior court from assessor's award, reasonable expenses, and liability of cost relating to  
 18 issues of law.

19 **SECTION 7.**

20 Said title is further amended by striking Code Section 22-2-100, relating to the definition of  
 21 "condemning body" and "condemnor," and inserting in its place a new Code section to read  
 22 as follows:

23 "22-2-100.

24 As used in this article, 'condemning body' or 'condemnor' means:

- 25 (1) The State of Georgia or any branch or any department, board, commission, agency,  
 26 or authority of the executive branch of the government of the State of Georgia;
- 27 (2) Any county or municipality of the State of Georgia;
- 28 (3) Any housing authority with approval of the governing authority of the city or county  
 29 as provided in Code Section 8-3-31.1;
- 30 (4) Any other political subdivision of the State of Georgia which ~~is vested with~~ possesses  
 31 the power of eminent domain; and
- 32 (5) All public utilities that possess the right or power of eminent domain. ~~All other~~  
 33 ~~persons possessing the right or power of eminent domain."~~

3 **SECTION 9.**

4 Said title is further amended by striking Code Section 22-2-102.1, relating to petitioning  
5 superior court for judgment in rem in cases of eminent domain, and inserting in its place a  
6 new Code section to read as follows:

7 "22-2-102.1.

8 In addition to the requirements set forth in Code Section 22-1-10, whenever ~~Whenever~~ it  
9 shall be necessary for such condemning body to take or damage private property, or any  
10 interest or easement therein, in pursuance of any law so authorizing, for any public ~~purpose~~  
11 use, and where, by reason of the necessities of the public needs, of which the condemning  
12 body shall be the exclusive judge, and it shall be desirable for these reasons to have a quick  
13 and effective adjudication of the just and adequate compensation to be paid the owner or  
14 owners of such property before taking the same, and it shall be desirable to have a judicial  
15 ascertainment and judicial supervision of all questions and proceedings connected with the  
16 matter, such condemning body may, through any authorized representative, petition the  
17 superior court of the county having jurisdiction, for a judgment in rem against said  
18 property, or any easement or other interest in said property, condemning the same in fee  
19 simple to the use of the petitioner upon payment of just and adequate compensation  
20 therefor."

21 **SECTION 10.**

22 Said title is further amended by striking Code Section 22-2-102.2, relating to contents of  
23 petition to superior court for judgment in rem in cases of eminent domain, and inserting in  
24 its place a new Code section to read as follows:

25 "22-2-102.2.

26 The petition referred to in Code Section 22-2-102.1 shall set forth:

- 27 (1) The facts showing the right to condemn;  
28 (2) The property or interest to be taken or damaged;  
29 (3) The names and residences of the persons whose property or interests are to be taken  
30 or otherwise affected, so far as known;  
31 (4) A description of any unknown persons or classes of unknown persons whose rights  
32 in the property or interest are to be affected; ~~and~~  
33 (5) A statement setting forth the necessity to condemn the private property and  
34 describing the public use for which the condemnor seeks the property; and  
35 ~~(5)(6)~~ (6) Such other facts as are necessary for a full understanding of the cause."

All municipalities, counties, and housing authorities shall have standing pursuant to this article."

**SECTION 19.**

Title 36 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to local government, is amended by striking subsection (b) of Code Section 36-42-8, relating to the powers of downtown development authorities generally, and inserting a new subsection (b) to read as follows:

"(b) The powers enumerated in each paragraph of subsection (a) of this Code section are cumulative of and in addition to those powers enumerated in the other paragraphs of subsection (a) of this Code section and elsewhere in this chapter; and no such power limits or restricts any other power of the authority except that, notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, no authority described in this chapter shall be granted the power of eminent domain."

**SECTION 20.**

Said title is further amended by repealing Code Section 36-42-8.1, relating to the use of the power of eminent domain by a municipality or downtown development authority.

**SECTION 21.**

Said title is further amended by repealing subsection (c) of Code Section 36-44-6, relating to a redevelopment agency's ability to delegate the power of eminent domain, which reads as follows:

"(c) A downtown development authority which has been designated as a redevelopment agency pursuant to this chapter may exercise the powers of eminent domain subject to the procedures established in Chapter 42 of this title."

**SECTION 22.**

Said title is further amended in Chapter 61, the "Urban Redevelopment Law," by adding after Code Section 36-61-3 a new Code Section 36-61-3.1 to read as follows:

"36-61-3.1.

(a) As used in this Code section, the term 'public use' shall have the meaning specified in Code Section 22-1-1.

(b) Any exercise of the power of eminent domain under this chapter must:

(1) Be for a public use; and

(2) Be approved by resolution of the governing body of the municipality or county in conformity with the procedures specified in Code Section 22-1-10."

**SECTION 23.**

Said title is further amended by designating the existing text of Code Section 36-62-6, relating to the general powers of a development authority, as subsection (a) and by adding a new subsection, to be designated subsection (b), to read as follows:

"(b) This Code section shall not be construed as authorizing an authority as defined in this chapter to exercise the power of eminent domain."

**SECTION 24.**

Said title is further amended by striking paragraph (1) of subsection (a) of Code Section 36-82-62, relating to power as to undertakings and issuance of revenue bonds by government bodies, and inserting in its place a new paragraph (1) to read as follows:

"(1) To acquire, by gift, purchase, or the exercise of the right of eminent domain, and to construct, to reconstruct, to improve, to better, and to extend any undertaking wholly within or wholly outside the governmental body or partially within and partially outside the governmental body; and to acquire, by gift, purchase, or the exercise of the right of eminent domain, lands, easements, rights in lands, and water rights in connection therewith. For property located within a city, the extraterritorial exercise of eminent domain for redevelopment purposes shall be approved by resolution by the governing authority of the city. For property located in an unincorporated area of a county, the extraterritorial exercise of eminent domain for redevelopment purposes shall be approved by resolution by the governing authority of the county. Any such resolution shall be adopted under the procedures specified in Code Section 22-1-10 and shall specifically and conspicuously delineate each parcel to be affected. The requirement for approval by a governing authority under this Code section shall be in addition to any other approval required by Title 22;"
