





Balance of State Continuum of Care

HUD Continuum of Care

A Continuum of Care (CoC) is established by representatives of relevant organizations within a geographic area to carry out the responsibilities set forth in the CoC Program interim rule.

Georgia Balance of State CoC has 152 counties.



HUD Continuum of Care Program

The CoC Program is designed to assist individuals and families experiencing homelessness and to provide the services needed to help them move into permanent housing, with the goal of long-term stability.

- ☐ To develop a long-term strategic plan and manage a year-round planning effort that addresses
 - the needs of homeless individuals and households;
 - the availability and accessibility of existing housing and services; and
 - the opportunities for linkages with mainstream housing and services resources.
- ☐ To prepare an **application** for McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (McKinney-Vento) competitive grants.
- ☐ To have an independent Board of Directors, maintain a written Governance Charter, set and meet goals to prevent and end homelessness, and implement all other requirements of the HEARTH Act

Collaborative Applicant (DCA) Responsibilities

- To provide oversight for the Continuum in order to meet HUD's rule for Continua of Care and to assure that requirements are met for the annual HUD Continuum of Care funding competition.
- Maintain Continuum membership lists, conduct membership recruitment campaigns targeted to stakeholders, publish agendas for membership meetings, and assist the Board in conducting meetings of full membership not less than twice annually.
- Consult with both ESG Entitlements and HUD Consolidated Planning jurisdictions.
- Implement and coordinate the biennial unsheltered point in time count and the annual shelter survey.
- Provide staff for planning and implementation of HEARTH Act requirements and overall CoC strategies

Membership

- Formalized process
- Agency representation and individuals
- Voting Designated voting member (agencies only)
- Participation Code of Conduct Policy approved 5/19/21
 - Attend not less than one meeting (membership, Board, Committee, or Subcommittee) per year
 - Agencies can substitute staff for meeting participation
 - Inactive or non-voting members to be reviewed
- CoC-funded providers are expected to participate (membership & attendance)

Balance of State Continuum of Care Board of Directors

- The Board currently consists of 19 member seats, either appointed by state agency heads, or elected by the Continuum membership.
- Continuum membership will elect 5 "at large" board members.
- Appointments must be relevant to the Continuum, either providing direct or homeless funding, services, mainstream services, or other indirect services to persons experiencing homelessness or community organizations in the Continuum.

2022 Continuum of Care Competition (Results)

2022 BoS CoC Competition

- 62 Projects in the final ranking
 - 57 PSH & RRH Renewals
 - 2 HMIS Renewals
 - 2 Coordinated Assessment Renewals
 - 1 NEW RRH utilizing reallocated funds
- 2 Projects opted not to request funding for renewal of their project totaling \$206,287, but only \$184,370 eligible for reallocation
- Board Approved 9/12/22

2022 BoS CoC Competition

- Project Funding Requested following Approved Adjustments:
 - •Tier 1: \$19,633,469
 - •Tier 2: \$1,011,423
 - •Total: \$20,644,892
 - •CoC Planning (non-competitive): \$758,386
- •Total: \$21,403,278

2022 BoS CoC Competition

- 2022 Notice of Funding Opportunity was published on August 1st
- Georgia Balance of State CoC Competition opened Tuesday, August 9th.
 - Review Applications were due August 18th
 - HUD Application (e-snaps) were due August 29th
 - Final CoC Application submitted
 September 29th

 - Rural Homelessness Set Aside (5 approved))
 - 2 New PSH
 - 1 New Standalone SSO
 - 1 New SSO-CE
 - 1 New SSO-SO

2022 Balance of State CoC Special Competition Results

- Submitted October 20, 2022
- Final Funding Request following Approved Adjustments:
 - Rural Homelessness Set Aside \$5,149,382
 - Unsheltered Homelessness Set Aside \$11,382,674





2011 - 2022 BoS Unsheltered PIT Counts





2011 - 2022 BoS Sheltered PIT Counts







Homeless Count Trend 2011 - 2022




Sheltered vs. Unsheltered Count




Homeless Status by Gender



Homeless Status by Race




Homeless Status by Household Type





Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program Award

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
- Georgia BoS awarded \$11,699,223
- Timeline:
 - Coordinated Community Plan (CCP), due in late April
 - Must address 4 outcomes:
 - 1. Stable housing
 - 2. Education + employment
 - 3. Permanent connections
 - 4. Well-being
- HUD review and approval of plan must take place before project can begin accepting and reviewing applications

Utilizing our YHDP funding/ examples from past YHDP communities

- Supportive services:
 - including case
 management,
 transportation support,
 skill building,
 mentorship, addressing
 mental & physical health
 needs, literacy,
 employment, education,
 & training.
- Housing interventions:
 - RRH, TH, Host Homes, PSH

- More miscellaneous:
 - Diversion, direct cash transfers, systems navigation



How is HOME-ARP Different?

Funded through the American Rescue Plan Act

- \$5 Billion in HOME nationwide for activities to be funded through 2030
- Combines HOME Regulations with McKinney Vento (Homeless) Regulations

New Beneficiaries:

People who are Homeless/At Risk for Homelessness

New Activities:

Non-Congregate Shelters and Supportive Services

Qualifying Populations

Those who are:

- Homeless
- At risk of homelessness
- Fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking
- Other households requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness but do not otherwise qualify under the other categories

Eligible Activities

- Develop affordable rental housing
- Acquisition and development of non-congregate shelter units (NCS)
- Tenant-based rental assistance (TBRA) allocated to ESG-CV
- Supportive services
- 15% for Administrative Costs
- 5% for operating assistance to nonprofits carrying out HOME-ARP activities

Non-Congregate Shelter Development	\$ 8,765,517	10%
Increased Coordinated Entry/Administration	\$ 8,765,517	10%
Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (ESG-CV)	\$ 3,600,000	4.1%
Supportive Services & Financial Assistance	\$ 2,100,000	2.4%
Total	\$ 87,655,165	100%

Rental Housing

- Annual applications 2023-2027 (construction complete by 9/2030)
- Developments must have Project Based Rental Assistance to cover operating expenses for very low-income tenants
- Can pay 100% of costs to acquire, construct new/rehab rental housing
- 70% of units must be qualifying populations tenants & 30% low-income

Non-Congregate Shelter (NCS)

- Annual applications 2023-2025
- Private units or rooms with bathroom in each unit (can have shared kitchens or kitchenettes)
- Construction of new structures or acquisition/rehab of existing structures (such as motels, nursing homes, schools, churches, or other facilities)
- HOME-ARP <u>cannot</u> cover shelter operating expenses
- Project Sponsors must be able to pay for staff, operations, maintenance for compliance period (<15 years)

Coordinated Entry

What is Coordinated Entry?

Coordinated Entry is a process through which people experiencing homelessness access the crisis response system in a streamlined way, have their strengths and needs quickly assessed, and are quickly connected to appropriate, tailored housing and mainstream services within the community or designated region.

CE in the BoS CoC

- •7 Implementation Sites
- Bartow, Bibb, Colquitt, Coastal (Bryan, Camden, Glynn, Liberty, McIntosh, and Wayne), Burke, Hall, and Gwinnett
 - Grow coverage area
- •DCA OHSN Toll-free hotline connect callers to implementation sites, emergency shelter, other funded agencies
- Areas outside of implementation sites 1-844-249-8367

Coordinated Entry Technical Assistance

Project Overview

Provide in-depth CES capacity building and system redesign for the Georgia Balance of State

Five potential project phases:

- 1. Stakeholder Feedback and Needs Assessment
- 2. Access Point Evaluation
- 3. Assessment Tool Review
- 4. Recommendations for Redesign
- 5. Policies and Procedures Development
- Projection of project timeline is dependent of community engagement.
