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Introduction

The Joint Comprehensive Plan for Wilkinson County and the cities of Allentown, Gordon, Irwinton, Ivey, McIntyre, and Toomsboro was adopted in **** 2022 and is in fulfillment of the requirement of Chapter 110-12-1: Minimum Standards and Procedures for Local Comprehensive Planning set by the Georgia Department of Community Affairs. The goal of this plan is to serve as the guiding document for the physical development and guide to land use in Wilkinson County and its cities. This plan is a living document, capable of being amended, updated, and improved to provide a flexible framework for development across the county for the next 20 years. This plan was built around and details the vision, goals, needs, and opportunities, current and future land use, and a five-year community work program that will help Wilkinson County and its cities evaluate new projects, direct capital improvements, guide public policy and ensure the county has the capability to prosper in the years to come.

Planning Process

The Middle Georgia Regional Commission met with each local government in Wilkinson County in February of 2022 to discuss the Comprehensive Plan update requirement and to introduce the process. These planning meetings allowed each jurisdiction to determine the best approach for plan development and stakeholder involvement. Based on that input, the Comprehensive Plan process formally began with the initial public hearing held on March 24, 2022, at 5:30 p.m. in the Wilkinson County Courthouse. Documentation from this meeting can be found in the Appendix.

The purpose of the first public hearing was to brief the community on the process to be used to develop the Joint Comprehensive Plan, opportunities for public participation, and obtain input on the planning process. The meeting was attended by representatives from all municipalities except for the City of Allentown due to a scheduling conflict. An additional follow-up meeting was convened in Allentown to make sure that they received the same information and opportunity for obtaining their feedback. The planning process schedule is included in the table on the following page.

After initial meetings with Wilkinson County and its cities, it was determined that the most effective method for public engagement was to launch a public input survey and attend the Irwinton Farmers' Market held on May 3, 2022. Approximately 25 people attended the Farmer's Market, allowing MGRC staff to distribute copies of the survey to residents, most of whom were neither aware of the survey nor the county's joint comprehensive plan. Surveys were additionally made available to residents on the county and city websites, as well as distributed in hard copies at the various meetings. Between paper and online surveys, around 50 responses were received. These responses were used to guide discussion at the steering committee meetings as a representation of resident concerns for each of the comprehensive plan topics.

For the phase of the Comprehensive Plan Update involving Steering Committee meetings, Wilkinson County and its cities coordinated with the Middle Georgia Regional Commission to determine the most effective manner for conducting meetings with stakeholder participation. The schedule of steering committee meetings for each local government is included in the table on the following page. The meetings started with a synopsis of the comprehensive plan and an update on the planning process. The discussion for each topic included a review of the vision and goals from the 2017 Comprehensive Plan, sharing results from the surveys and other residents to the online survey; hard copies were also available. relevant information, and group

engagement exercises including mapping activities, analyses of strengths, weaknesses,

After the initial Steering Committee meetings, the Middle Georgia Regional Commission took the information gathered (including input from the Farmers' Market and survey) and began drafting the goals, needs, and opportunities for the Joint Comprehensive Plan Update. These drafts were brought to the next round of meetings with each local government when discussing the Community Work Program in June, July, and August. At these Community Work Program meetings, the groups reviewed the 2017 Community Work Program and gave updates on the previous projects and initiatives before discussing potential new projects for the 2022 – 2027 update to be included in the new Community Work Program.

The draft of the Comprehensive Plan was shared with Wilkinson County and its cities on August 10, 2022. The governments were given time to read over the plan and provide their thoughts before the second required public hearing was held on August 10, 2022, to present the plan to the public. Final comments were received over the following days and incorporated into the plan

before it was submitted to the Georgia Department of Community Affairs for their formal review before being adopted by each municipality. All of the documentation from these meetings is included in the appendix.

Vision

The 2017 vision statement was reviewed in the early stages of the steering committee meetings. It was amended slightly for verbiage, but overall, the theme and messaging from the previous vision statement were found to still be largely applicable today. The 2022 vision statement is below.

"Wilkinson County and the cities of Allentown, Gordon, Irwinton, Ivey, McIntyre, and Toomsboro seek to build a community where people of all ages desire to call home; a community of abundant natural resources, which strives to inspire the engagement of its citizenry, celebrate the diversity of its culture and people, promote the humane treatment of animals, and educate its youth so they can contribute fully to the growth of our region.

We are an area of family values and regional pride, committed to collaboration, growing jobs, and improving our community and the lives of our residents."

Economic Development

Goals:

- 1. Attract new industry throughout the community.
- 2. Maintain and develop existing land for business.
- 3. Further develop and advertise entertainment options and events.

Needs/Opportunities:

1. Development opportunities in Wilkinson County could be enhanced with a full-time Economic Development Director.

Currently, there is no full-time economic development director in the Wilkinson County government. Much of this work falls to the part-time Development Authority director or another county administrative staff. A full-time director of economic development for Wilkinson County would allow for increased economic opportunities for the county; having someone at the county level to focus on these issues of economic development every day may begin to open new doors for development in Wilkinson County.

2. There is a lack of short-term lodging for visitors to Wilkinson County.

One of the barriers that exists in Wilkinson County that is deterring visitors coming to the county for various activities is the lack of short-term lodging options. There is a lack of hotels, motels, bed-and-breakfast, RV parks, and other short-term lodging options. Without such amenities, people have a hard time spending more than a day in Wilkinson County unless they intend to stay with a friend or family member. Finding ways to encourage the development of short-term lodging, including encouraging small bed-and-breakfast type establishments, could be one step in attracting visitors to Wilkinson County which will stimulate the local economy.

3. Existing development sites could be made more attractive for industries.

Wilkinson County hopes to continue to draw industries into the county with the success of previous economic development projects such as the Fall Line Regional Development Park establishment and the arrival of Zschimmer & Schwarz. The County wishes to diversify its economy after a years-long reliance on the kaolin mining and processing industry. Though this is still a prevalent industry in the county – and should continue to be for years to come – it is beginning to suffer locally from globalization, with emerging kaolin producers in other countries causing many jobs to leave Wilkinson County and the United States as a whole. Retention of talent in Wilkinson County has also been an issue over the last several years; the county is hopeful

that recent economic successes will attract talent and bring new industries back to Wilkinson County.

The Wilkinson County Development Authority is also hopeful to implement a Freeport Tax Exemption. Wilkinson County is one of only three counties in the state that does not have an exemption on inventory for its industries. This serves as a competitive disadvantage to the county compared to surrounding areas for prospective warehousing or manufacturing industries. Implementing a Freeport Tax Exemption would allow for the continuation of economic momentum that the county has experienced over the past several years and would signal to warehouse and distribution industry that Wilkinson County welcomes them.

4. Additional land could be acquired throughout the county for new industrial development.

Wilkinson County has expressed an interest in attracting more industry to the county as an ongoing initiative. Part of this strategy includes the need to strategically acquire additional land to be used for industrial development by the Wilkinson County Development Authority. Currently, the Development Authority has six available properties for future industry development, with hopes to increase its inventory in the future. Acquiring additional land would increase the diversity of land types in the county's inventory, allowing them to better market the community as a whole to industrial prospects.

5. Quality of life improvements and additional amenities are needed to be a more attractive community to a younger and more professional workforce.

Due in part to the COVID-19 pandemic as well as generational trends, younger workforce professionals (millennials, generation Z, and more) are choosing smaller, more rural areas in which to live and work. Offering a variety of businesses and activities targeted to this population will promote the growth of Wilkinson County and its cities to a younger generation. Studying trends in commercial market leakage and economic development, commercial revitalization, and recreational potential will help to attract young professionals to Wilkinson County.

Natural & Cultural Resources

Goals:

- 1. Promote outdoor recreational opportunities.
- 2. Expand recreational opportunities.

Needs/Opportunities:

1. The Wilkinson County Recreation Department could be improved with more personnel.

Currently, the Wilkinson County Recreation Director is the sole paid personnel in the recreation department. The Recreation Program relies on volunteers to help with games and events. This can lessen the quality of the recreational sports and other events put on by Wilkinson County. If Wilkinson County could recruit more volunteers or hire more part-time personnel, then the events and other recreational programming would be of higher quality and attract more participants.

2. Support the Wilkinson County Recreation Department with additional funding.

The Recreation Department operates on very limited funding. It has caused problems due to a lack of personnel, the inability to rent transportation for sports teams, and an inability to create new opportunities. These issues have led to a loss of participation by citizens in Wilkinson County. Many citizens will travel to either Macon-Bibb or Milledgeville to use recreational facilities and participate in sports leagues. Wilkinson County is interested in allocated additional funds for recreation as well as external

funding opportunities, such as the Land and Water Conservation Funds and Recreational Trails grant funds from Georgia Department of Natural Resources. With more funding, the program could recruit more participants for recreational sports, create new recreational facilities, such as trails and basketball courts, and increase the quality of life for Wilkinson County residents.

Community Facilities & Services

Goals:

- 1. Improve access to healthcare and hospitals.
- 2. Support the efficiency of public safety and public health.
- 3. Improve water and sewer infrastructure throughout the county.
- 4. Maintain existing public buildings.

Needs/Opportunities:

1. Increase the number of ambulances in the county and expand locations from which ambulances are posted to ensure faster response times.

During stakeholder sessions, several residents voiced concerns that the county's contracted ambulance service. Currently there are two ambulances posted in Wilkinson County and stakeholders expressed a need for a third ambulance to meet the emergency medical needs and response times required to meet residents' needs. The sparsely populated unincorporated areas in the southern portion of the county increase the difficulty of providing rapid response times compounded by the extensive distance to the nearest hospitals. Grant funding assistance may facilitate the procurement of critical public health needs such as EMS vehicles and mobile diagnostic equipment.

2. Pursue staggered purchase plans for replacing public safety vehicles and equipment.

Like many rural counties, Wilkinson County relies on grant funding assistance to replace and expand some of its public safety vehicles and equipment. The county can increase its competitiveness by prioritizing assets by the types of grants for which applications are made and diversifying requests based on the estimated life cycle of county vehicles and public safety equipment.

3. The availability of public water and sewer services varies throughout the county.

The availability of reliable, high-quality water and sewer services is critical for all communities to thrive and grow. To facilitate economic development, the water and sewer infrastructure must be improved so that the industry can have the reliability and capacity they need to sustain its operations. This is also a need for continuing to ensure a high quality of life for residents. A lack of quality, reliable water, and sewer service can lead to significantly higher homeownership costs in the long run and can jeopardize the overall health of the community. Continued pursuit of Community Development Block Grant funding is one option to address these challenges. The

opportunity also exists for the county to reexamine the most effective means of service delivery. This may include exploring the re-establishment of the Wilkinson County Water and Sewer Authority to improve efficiency in some parts of the community.

4. Restore and maintain the county courthouse.

Despite the recent completion of repairs to the county courthouse's rotunda, a leaking roof, and broken pipes, there is a need to bring the courthouse back to a suitable level of maintenance. As a historic symbol for the community and one of the largest gathering spaces in the county, a regularly scheduled maintenance plan must be implemented to ensure the building's availability for government operations and civic events and activities.

Housing

Goals:

- 1. Create a diversity of housing options within the Community
- 2. Ensure adequacy of current housing stock.

Needs/Opportunities:

1. Encourage senior housing developments throughout the county to support the aging population and attract retirees to Wilkinson County.

Throughout stakeholder sessions and other community outreach, citizens and stakeholders mentioned that the County was a wonderful place to retire and that they would appreciate the County focusing on housing options geared toward attracting retirees. When it comes to increasing the diversity of housing stock, citizens mentioned that they would like to see Senior options, such as independent living neighborhoods and assisted living facilities. The potential exists for county officials and economic developers to pursue unique new incentives to attract housing developers. This could be done in a variety of ways, either by exploring direct tax incentives or by identifying non-profit partners in the community who can also contribute to the overall stock of affordable housing.

2. There are many blighted properties throughout Wilkinson County.

Similar to the issues regarding the overall quality of the housing stock, the presence of blight contributes to a perception of poor housing availability. Many affordable homes may have been neglected and become blighted over the years. This is compounded by the challenge of a

declining population throughout much of the county, as younger generations move away, then inherit property, but never return to take care of it. Absentee landowners are a common cause of blight, and sometimes among the most difficult to hold accountable for property upkeep, especially when the title to a property has become complex over time. Wilkinson County and the cities can develop a variety of

tools to highlight housing concerns, including more stringent code enforcement, housing assessments, and financial penalties on blighted properties. Enforcing these changes requires a significant investment of time and money. Where civic groups can support the goal of adequate housing through blight remediation, steady incremental progress can be made. Likewise, several grants can also be pursued to assist low-income homeowners; however, many significant needs remain in this regard.

3. There is a lack of consistent code enforcement practices across the county.

During the stakeholder sessions, community members noted that many of the cities and towns have levels of code enforcement, such as an officer or other implemented strategies. Some communities have no code enforcement at all. Code enforcement is not uniform or consistent across the jurisdictions. Community members and tourists driving through both city and county areas are going to notice blight, trash, and other code enforcement issues. Stakeholders saw an opportunity to coordinate with these policies to improve the county-wide aesthetic. Improving code enforcement will make the community more inviting for tourists and a better place to live for citizens.

Transportation

Goals:

- 1. Make the county and cities more bicycle and pedestrian friendly.
- 2. Better advertise the available on-demand public transportation system.
- 3. Improve vehicle mobility and safety efforts.

<u>Needs/Opportunities</u>:

1. Need to expand and improve sidewalks in cities.

While Wilkinson County is overall a very rural community, the cities are relatively compact and many residents, particularly those who are elderly, disabled, or impoverished, rely on the ability to walk short distances for daily activities, such as a general store or convenience store. Unfortunately, the sidewalk and crosswalk infrastructure needs improvement to ensure the safe and easy movement of pedestrians in all cities. Narrow residential streets frequently lack sidewalks altogether, and major corridors have sidewalks that have not been properly maintained for years due to a lack of available resources.

2. Increase transit ridership by marketing its availability to potential transit users.

The Wilkinson County Transit System operates three transit shuttle buses, of which two are handicapped accessible. Public transportation is viewed as a service for residents, like public safety, which will not generate revenue or even break even with the investment made by the county. Grant funds are tremendously beneficial to the county's efforts to provide a quality transportation service. Recognizing the benefit that transit provided to many residents, the goal is to continue extending system usage however possible to provide Figure 5 – Transit shuttle buses. efficient transportation to on-demand



services for the community, including those that may be in Dublin, Macon-Bibb, or Milledgeville. Increased ridership generates higher fare revenue, which ultimately lowers the county's costs for providing this service. It was apparent through public forums and surveys for this plan update that many residents were not aware of the availability of this service. A need exists for expanding its marketing to a broader spectrum of potential riders through fliers on message boards at medical facilities and doctors' offices, church bulletins, and generally, places where residents likely to use transit congregate.

3. Enhance roadway infrastructure and safety efforts.

Many roadways throughout the county need general improvements and enhancements to infrastructure and safety. This includes well-paved and well-maintained roads that are clearly striped, with visible intersections and guardrails where needed. This is particularly important on the winding roadways that characterize many of the rural parts of the county with rugged, hilly terrain and minimal road lighting. There is an ongoing need for collaboration between the local governments in Wilkinson County and Georgia Department of Transportation to effectively manage the maintenance of the roadway infrastructure. Likewise, the need remains for funding these improvements from both local and state sources.

Broadband

Goals:

Improve coverage across Wilkinson County, especially in the unincorporated areas, where 25/3 Mbps service is not available

Needs/Opportunities:

1. There are several unserved areas of Wilkinson County where 25/3 Mbps service is not available

Wilkinson County has nearly 50 percent of its residences and businesses unserved for broadband service, and most of this is in the unincorporated parts of the county, especially in the western part of the county. These areas are currently less densely populated than the incorporated areas of the county, but still contain a significant number of people. As the county makes efforts to support growth, it will become increasingly necessary to find solutions for broadband connectivity in these unserved areas.


2. The local government process for broadband services could be enhanced through the Broadband Ready program

The municipalities in Wilkinson County do not have pre-established processes relating to broadband service and broadband infrastructure permitting like those detailed in the Broadband Ready Model Ordinance. Adopting this ordinance and seeking a Broadband Ready designation would signal to potential broadband providers, including EMCs, that Wilkinson County is interested in working to find solutions to the unserved and underserved areas in the community. Not only could this entice providers to offer broadband service in places where it currently is unavailable, but it could create competition in already-served areas to provide faster, more reliable, and more affordable service.

3. EMCs are able to provide internet service which could bring high-speed connectivity to unserved areas of Wilkinson County

As seen on the map on the following page, there are a significant amount of unserved Census Blocks in Wilkinson County, primarily in the unincorporated areas. However, several of them were awarded in the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund (RDOF) Auction 904 and have prospective internet service providers looking to expand service in the future, including EMCs. Over the next several years, as required in the regulations of the RDOF Auction 904, several of the unserved and underserved areas will have an expansion of broadband service available to them.

Analysis of Unserved Areas




Map 1 – Broadband availability in Wilkinson County.

The State of Georgia, as part of the Georgia Broadband Deployment Initiative (GBDI), undertook a large-scale survey of broadband access, mapping more than 5 million locations of homes and businesses across the state, and overlaying that data with information on broadband provider service availability. 
As can be seen from Map 1, the majority of the unserved areas in Wilkinson County are unincorporated areas. However, even within some of the incorporated areas – including Allentown, Irwinton, and McIntyre – there are several unserved Census Blocks. Collectively, only 50 percent of Census Block locations throughout Wilkinson County are considered served, meaning that at least 80 percent of locations within the block meet the FCC's minimum definition of broadband service (at least 25 Mbps download speed and at least 3 Mbps upload speed).

Considering the levels of service that are available throughout most of the county, the primary areas of focus for new service provision are in two quadrants of the unincorporated western side of Wilkinson County which contain a mixture of residential, commercial, industrial, and public

buildings. Map 2 (right) shows the first identified area with points indicating the location of residential, commercial, industrial, and public buildings. Expanding service along GA-96 and Turkey Creek Road would catch а significant number of the dense unserved areas that can be seen in this quadrant. A significant portion of this area was not awarded under the recent Rural Digital Opportunity Fund (RDOF) Auction 904 and would be an ideal location to submit for future grants.

Map 3 (left) shows the other identified area with points indicating the location of residential, commercial, industrial, and public buildings. This area was selected due to the industrial area east of GA-18 and the number of homes in unserved areas along Asbury Church and White Springs Church roads. While some of the areas along White Springs Church Road were awarded in the RDOF Auction 904, it could still be several years until service is improved for those residents. Conversely, the homes along Asbury Church Road and the industrial area east of GA-18 were not awarded in the RDOF Auction 904 and would

benefit from proactive action by Wilkinson County. All of these areas would benefit from increased service availability and will be desirable locations for grant applications in the future.

While there are unserved and underserved areas in the northeast and southeast Wilkinson County as well, those areas have less dense development, a less diverse mix of residential, commercial, industrial, and public buildings, and/or were identified in the RDOF Auction 904 to be served within the next few years. Nevertheless, these areas would still benefit from increased service availability.

Land Use

The land use maps in this section highlights the projected land uses of parcels in Wilkinson County in the years ahead. This map contains very few deviations from the current land use of those parcels. Wilkinson County lacks zoning codes or planning regulations to guide future land use decisions, with subdivision regulations being the only "zoning tool" used throughout the county. However, a few cities do have zoning ordinances, though some are not actively enforced. his section to describe the built environment and character of Wilkinson County and its cities.

Residential

Nearly all of the residential land use in Wilkinson County is made up of single-family residences. Of these, approximately onethird are manufactured homes, while the remaining two-thirds are stick-built, free-standing homes. The density of these homes is generally low in the unincorporated parts of the county but is much more dense in the cities. This allows for moderately walkable and close-



in the cities. This allows for moderately walkable and close-

knit communities. County residents and the steering committee have described a need for more affordable housing and a diversity of housing types, particularly starter homes for younger families and senior homes for the aging community. As of now, there is a lack of both of these types of housing amenities.

Commercial

Commercial land use in Wilkinson County is not especially prevalent and is often clustered around the town centers. Larger strip development is not seen in Wilkinson County, and most residents must leave the county for neighboring counties to visit larger retail providers. Convenience

stores and dollar stores are generally the in-county sellers of basic household groceries, although the City of Gordon does have a Piggly Wiggly supermarket. Almost all commercial areas are located within or directly adjacent to cities where water and/or sewer services are available. Wilkinson County citizens and leaders both recognize the need for additional shopping options in the county. The county lacks infrastructure and amenities to attract new commercial development, it remains uncertain if the presence of commercial establishments will increase over the next several years.

Industrial

Wilkinson County has several industrial sites for its existing and future land use. The largest of these sites are the kaolin mining and processing sites, mostly found in the central parts of the county along Georgia's Fall Line where kaolin is plentiful. This includes several active facilities around Gordon and Ivey and between Gordon and McIntyre, as well as the Fall Line Industrial Park where the county works jointly with Baldwin County.

Public/Institutional

The county and its cities generally lack extensive public or institutional land use, outside of churches, schools, and general-purpose local government buildings. There are no large state or

federal public facilities in Wilkinson County. There has been a desire by leadership in some of the cities to develop resource centers with where rotating services residents can receive various and health educational resources. The Town of Toomsboro is currently in the process of acquiring а building to house such a facility.

Transportation/Communication/Utilities

Much of the community infrastructure is present in existing rights-of-way throughout Wilkinson County and does not show up on a future land use map as its respective parcels for this reason. However, some substations, towers, and transportation lines do appear on the map in this layer.

Parks/Recreation/Conservation

The conservation category includes small parks throughout the community, as well as the larger Balls Ferry State Park on the Oconee River. Only a few parcels have been deliberately set aside for conservation use, although some areas like floodplains can certainly expect to see less development. The county has a recreation complex, as well as some smaller parks in the cities, with some cities having expressed interest in expanding or developing new parks through avenues, such as the Land and Water Conservation Fund grant.

Agriculture/Forestry

The majority of the land in Wilkinson County, especially in the unincorporated parts of the county, has the land use of agriculture and forestry. These areas are characterized by very low densities of single-family housing, forests reserved for timbering, and small- to medium-sized farms. Given the topography of Wilkinson County along Georgia's Fall Line, forestry is more common due to a general lack of flat land suitable for farming. Some of these properties have had conservation easements placed on them over the years; however, these are shorter-term designations and still allow some uses on the property.




Figure 07 – Wilkinson County contains many sizeable tracts of land like the one pictured above that are suitable for agricultural or forestry uses.


Undeveloped/Vacant


Although a significant amount of land within the county lacks the presence of structures, no future land use is categorized as vacant land. Much of the land area that lacks residential or commercial structures also lacks utility coverage. While very low-density development could be possible in these areas, this land is considered most suitable for agricultural or forestry uses.


Mixed-Use


As a small rural community, Wilkinson County lacks mixed-use development and has little desire for adding mixed-use development, given the availability and affordability of land for modest greenfield development. As such, no future land use is categorized as mixed-use.




